Very many thanks to everyone who went along to the Harvest Fayre and either took part in the Scarecrow Competition or supported the St Mary's School and PTA stall. Mrs Callender



and Mrs Benson were kept very busy selling Pumpkin Soup, they raised over £80, and the Bottle and Chocolate Tombola run by the PTA also proved very popular and raised in excess of £500. I was sorry not to be at the Fayre myself this year but there was a clash with a family wedding which had to take precedence. I am looking forward to next

year's Harvest Fayre and am wondering what the theme will be for the Scarecrow Competition in 2018.

Congratulations to everyone who took part in this year's Scarecrow competition especially our winners. Our Children from St Mary's secured a second and third places prize this year.

Tomfoolery

This week the PTA arranged an afternoon of magic and entertainment for our younger children. Children and their parents from local pre-schools were also invited and judging from the shrieks of laughter a good time was had by everyone. The event raised £300. Half of this will go to Springboard as Tomfoolery's chosen charity and the other half goes to the PTA.

It was lovely to see so many children from the different pre-schools and we look forward to seeing them all again at our **Open Afternoons on Thursday 2**nd and **Friday 3**rd **November.**

Meet the Teacher Evening

It was really lovely to see so many parents at our Meet the Teacher evening last week. Feedback has been very positive and it was especially nice to hear so many of you commenting on how wonderful our classrooms are looking.

A number of parents in Key Stage Two were asking about residential visits. This is something that the Governors and I have been looking into very carefully over recent months and a letter to all Key Stage Two parents will be sent out in the next week or so. The letter will outline our thoughts for extending the breadth of residential experiences we offer children at St Mary's and there will be a reply slip so that you can give

us your feedback. It is important that the residential visits we offer meet the children's needs, fulfil the demands of the National Curriculum and are cost effective. When your replies are back I will look at them all so that we can arrive

at a programme of residential visits that has taken everyone's views on board.

Another issue that arose at the Meet the Teacher Evening is the Homework Grid currently used in Key Stage Two. This was trialled last year in just a few classes and feedback taken from parents and children. Some adjustments were then made and a Homework Grid was then created for each Year Group from Y3 up to Y6. The response to this new initiative has been interesting in that in some classes parents and children have been overwhelmingly in favour whilst in other classes, sometimes in the same year group, parents have been less enthusiastic with a small number of you saying that the grids are too complicated and the tasks set too challenging. Again, this is something that we will look at carefully to see what changes need to be made either to the Homework Grids themselves or to the way in which they are introduced and explained to parents and children.

In Key Stage One many of you commented on how useful it was to see how we teach phonics. As a result we will be running a series of Phonics Workshops for parents so that everyone can be sure they are saying the sounds correctly and therefore helping children with not only their phonics but also reading, writing and spelling.

Also in Key Stage One there was a request for more books in the fiction library, particularly for the more able readers in Year Two. This is something that we were already aware of and we are working closely with the School Library service and Steyning Bookshop to source the best new titles.



The Meet the Teacher Evening did highlight one misunderstanding amongst the younger children. At the very start of term we asked children in Year Two not to play with their younger siblings who had just joined the Reception classes. This was so that the Reception children would start to make new friends from within their own classes and not rely on older brothers, sisters, cousins and friends. This was only ever intended as a short-term arrangement. Now that the Reception children have made friends amongst their peers we are more than happy for older brothers, sisters, cousins and friends to play with them.

They particularly wanted to focus on children's charities this year and I do think they have chosen extremely well.

As a school we will, of course, continue to support other charities with whom we already have a close link. These will include Appeal and Christian Aid.

The School Council are also keen to raise money for Children in Need and have suggested a Teacher's Quiz which does indeed sound very exciting. With the children writing the questions I think the teachers will find it quite a challenging event.

Amongst other things the School Council have also suggested a range of after-school and lunchtime clubs that teachers might like to run. These include a table tennis club, a tag rugby club, a gardening club and a general knowledge club. I will be talking to staff to see which of these can be set up. Children have also asked for more opportunities for free writing and maths. Again, I will be talking to teachers and we will look at class timetables to see what we can do.

Under the guidance of Miss Turner the new Eco-Council members have met twice now and have lots of good ideas for this academic year.



They have looked at the Waste Hierarchy and discussed the importance of 'The Three R's' - Reduce, Reuse and Recycle.

They are keen to devise new strategies to keep St Mary's litter free and ensure that we are all using our recycling bins correctly.

October is 'Walk to School Month' so the Council Members will be asking their classes how many times they have managed to walk to school each week. At the end of the month, Mrs Brown will be awarding a prize to the winning class.

Another piece of really good news is that St Mary's were placed in the top 100 schools in the Wastebuster Home Recycling Challenge - well done and thank you to everyone who took part in this competition last term.
