

Baseline Assessment

All the children have completed the Reception baseline assessment (RBA), this is always done within the first 6 weeks of starting reception.

What is the RBA?
The RBA is a short, interactive and practical assessment of your child's early literacy, communication, language and mathematics skills when they begin school, using materials that most children of your child's age will be familiar with.

What does participating in the RBA mean for my child? The RBA is not about judging or labelling your child or putting them under any pressure. Your child cannot 'pass' or fail' the assessment.

NELI

The NELI programme provides schools with a way of identifying early language difficulties and is proven to improve children's language skills and behaviour in school

Phonics phase 1-

In order for children to be able to read and write well they must be able to listen very carefully and discriminate between sounds. They should be taught to do this in a fun, exciting and active way with both planned and self-chosen activities.


- 1. Environmental Sounds
- 2. Instrumental Sounds
- 3. Body Percussion
- 4. Rhythm and Rhyme
- 5. Alliteration
- 6. Voice Sounds
- 7. Oral blending and Segmenting (short sounds)



Phase 2

- Teach 19 letter graphemes (shapes) and phonemes (sounds) (GPCs) all lower case)
- Move from oral blending and segmenting to doing the same with letters
- Learn to read and spell VC and CVC words using magnetic letters, whiteboards, phoneme fans
- Introduced to reading two syllable words and simple captions.
- Learn to read the tricky words I, no, go, the, to

Phase 2 Phoneme Mat

- Phase 2 Writing
 Until this point, the children have not been taught to form letters correctly.
- We have been doing lots of work in Physical Development to get ourselves ready for writing, lines and shapes in preparation for writing the children will all develop at different rates. A few are successfully forming letters, some are not ready yet. Don't worry, the children will develop at their own speed and will get there when they're ready.
- We use Drawing Club for writing to help learn new vocabulary, and become independent writers.

Reading Books

- All the children will already have a home reading book from school EYFS have choosey books and Yrl have reading books.
- Please read with your children as often as possible and write in their reading log.
- They should also be encouraged to read real books from home or the library. We are hoping to visit the village library soon. Please try and take your child down and have look at the lovely children's service.

Reading Books

- Reading books need to be sent back in in the book bag with a signed log.
- We read every day with the children in all subjects and will write in their reading logs once a week after whole class, individual. If you feel your child needs to change reading levels please email us.
- At this early stage when sharing picture books the focus is on talking through the pictures and developing the use of 'story book' language, as their phonic skills develop they will bring home books linked to the sounds we have taught.
- When reading the Big Cat Phonic Reading Scheme Books it is important that phonics is the first and main strategy used to decode the words. Books will be carefully matched to the phonemes they have been taught. Children will be taught to read 'tricky' words by sight.


- Please use the plastic wallets for books and reading logs only.

School Uniform

- Please ensure that all of your children's school uniform, including PE kits (when requested) and coats, are clearly labelled with their name.
- Check this regularly. If you notice the name is starting to wear off please could you rewrite it in so we know who items belong to.
- At the end of the day we try to collect all jumpers and cardigans, etc from the cloakroom to give out, please check your children's jumpers when they get home to ensure they are not wearing somebody else's. We can only return them if they are still clearly named.

Learning Journals

- One of the ways in which your child's progress is tracked in Reception is through collecting evidence of things they have said or done. These are put into a Learning Journal, which is simply a collection of your child's achievements.
- Throughout Reception this is used to work out your child's learning and their next steps.

Behaviour
